Paddling Kerr Lake and Roanoke River, Virginia and a visit to MacCallum More Museum and Gardens

Kerr Lake Dam and Reservoir (Buggs Island Lake) in Mecklenburg County, Virginia, was the scene June 26-29, 2022, for a summer campout organized by Stephanie Stringer and Steve Clayton. More than a dozen TATC paddlers camped at the public North Bend Park, operated by the Army Corps of Engineers. We were spread out on very nice campsites on Loop C, which feature their own sandy beaches, a short kayak carry from the tent sites.

In the 1950's, Kerr Reservoir, also called Bugg's Island Lake, was constructed primarily to provide for flood control and hydropower generation, and was named after a man named Samuel Bugg. Construction of the dam began in March 1947, in a spot on the Roanoke River a few hundred feet upstream from an island belonging to the descendants of Samuel Bugg; hence, the "Bugg's Island Project" was named during the construction years. The reservoir created is huge: 900 miles of wooded shoreline stretch across three counties in Virginia and three in North Carolina.

TATC folks enjoyed a communal gathering the first evening after getting tents up, and getting our kayaks down to the water. Some even got short paddles in the first day. On Day 2 we paddled in various coves and reaches of Kerr Lake. Some went for a bike ride. A hard rain sent everyone into their tents in the midafternoon, but let up in time for another communal meal with everyone supplying various potluck dishes.

On the third day, some of us responded to Richard Tarr's invitation to explore the Roanoke River immediately below the dam on a downstream paddle to Steel Bridge. Richard, Bob Adkisson, Svetlana Kononov and I thought it sounded fun. We shuttled a car to the takeout about 5-6 miles downriver, and then launched just below the dam. We had previously called the dam operations phone number to learn there were no scheduled water releases that morning to take into account. A powerhouse guard had told me that sometimes he had seen kayakers lined up and floating just below the dam to ride the surge, when releases were scheduled,.

As it was, we paddled around the actual Buggs Island, as the Roanoke River splits into two channels just below the dam, and we enjoyed a slow current. Downstream we explored a major tributary creek, Allens Creek. I felt the call of nature, and exited my kayak on what I thought was a slightly solid bit of shoreline. It was the most like quicksand I have ever been in; the mud sucked my feet down 8-10 inches and I had to pull my feet out of my slip-on water shoes and then wrestle my shoes out of the mud. YUK!

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We found an old abandoned, nasty, rusty dock to sit on for lunch on Allens Creek. Then we resumed our paddle, past endless fields of growing corn. Bob saw a large gar fish (3-4 feet) below his canoe. I only saw a few shore birds. The river is wide and Richard explored a couple coves on the other side, river right, and saw evidence of old manmade structures. We saw a type of weir dam/pipe up one short tributary that appeared to be capable of opening and shutting to admit river water to the corn fields beyond.

The Steel Bridge loomed up (route 615) and we took out at a public landing. Shuttling the cars and kayaks, we passed many fields of half-grown tobacco in its flowering stage. That night all of us drove to Boydton, the county seat of Mecklenburg, to enjoy a meal at a restaurant called Rose's. It's owned by a couple from Egypt, and the pizza was really good. Boydton is quaint, and seems to be making it commercially, although not without an abandoned downtown building or two.

On the last day we said our goodbyes and everyone made their own way home. Svetlana and I drove to Chase City, Virginia, to check out a botanical garden I had noticed on a map. This turned out to be a wonderful couple of hours exploring the MacCallum More Museum & Gardens, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Landmark Register. The MacCallum More home on the garden grounds is the home of a former Virginia Supreme Court Chief Justice, Edward Hudgins. A tour of both the home and the gardens/museum costs \$20.00; only \$10.00 for the gardens/museum.

The gardens, though small at six acres, house many unique statuary and other stone and metal features collected over decades by the son, CDR William Hudgins ("Billy") during decades of travel with the Navy in the Middle East, Far East, and South America, in the 1940s-1970s. One feature in particular is the Samurai Warrior seven feet tall cast in bronze. There are also Greek and Roman statues, fountains from southern Spain, and large U. S. Navy ship anchors (sort of anachronistic for a botanical gardens!). The museum houses a fantastic collection of Native American arrowheads (over 50,000 points) collected in the southeastern U.S, including thousand from Virginia and North Carolina, going back in time to 9500 B.C. The museum also tells some of the story of Chase City's history and its local company grown national, Estes Trucking.

The TATC Cabin Needs a Few More Friends

March 1st, 2022, the beginning of the club's fiscal year-- the cabin got off to a pretty normal start. It was rented out 7 nights in March and then, in April, it was rented 19 nights.

April is always one of the favorite months to rent the cabin, and this year 7 different people, or groups, spent time there. Usually this favorite time of the year trend continues on into the mild month of May, and then on into June. But not this year.

In the first half of May we had 2 lightly attended, weekend work trips to the cabin (for a total of 5 nights, with a total of 7 people), and then BOOM! That was it for the rest of May and all of June-no one rented the cabin for the next 40 nights. This may have been the longest ever dry spell. July started off with a 3 night rental, soon followed by another mini-work trip (3 people, and Bridgett

the dog, cutting weeds along the half mile access road out to the Blue Ridge Parkway). This was followed immediately by a 2 night rental on the 10th & 11th of July-- not a bad start for the month: 9 nights of usage in the first 11 nights of July.

But then, again-- complete silence, no one asking to reserve the cabin for the next 8 weeks, all the way into the month of Sept.

I was bothered and concerned enough that I sent out a group email to all the people that rented the cabin the previous year (plus I reached out to about a half dozen other members), telling them of the cabin renter drought we were experiencing, and asking that they check their calendars and maybe sign up for some time in the mountains.

Within two days of my plea, 2 people did email me back and reserved some time—a couple of nights at the end of July and a couple the first part of Sept. (Aug. Though is still totally wide open/available).

I am still waiting, hoping to hear from others.

But it is obvious that the TATC Putman Cabin is in need of at least a half dozen new, good friends, people that will discover it and love it and return again and again to enjoy it. **Cabin 'regulars'**, club members that rent it 2, maybe 3 times a year-- or more!

Here is the breakdown of the numbers from the last fiscal year (March 1st, 2021 to Feb. 28, 2022): Out of a club with about 450 members, only 23 different people rented the cabin in this 12 month period. Two of those people rented the cabin 5 times that year; one person used it 4 times; four people used it 3 times; three people rented it 2 times; and 13 people rented it just one time. This includes the 3 work trips, hosted by either Greg Hodges or myself (and no one pays any rental money on these trips). Altogether, the cabin was occupied 144 nights this fiscal year, and earned \$1816 in rental money. Of course, the rental money is not profit for the club-- it goes to pay off the hefty annual insurance bill, and the taxes, and for a few cabin supply items. The cabin usually breaks even.

But maybe not this year, unless things improve.

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
Of the 23 different club members that rented the cabin-- some of them did host a few other club members, or non-club friends and family, so actually more people did spend time there and experienced what the cabin has to offer.

It is a clear fact that the Covid situation has both challenged and effected the club, making it harder to get together as a group, harder to recruit new members and keep older ones. Some of the cabin 'regulars' from the last few years have had to cut back on their visits because of health or age concerns, and some have retired and instead gone on long cross-country trips, leaving them with less time to enjoy the cabin.

So, it is obvious-- we need those half dozen plus new members to find the club, to discover the Trail Club cabin, and to begin enjoying all that it has to offer in the way of peace and solitude, adventure and challenge, fun and contentment.

Of course, some of our long-time club members, ones who for whatever reason just don't go up and stay at the cabin, *ever*, could suddenly decide to give it a try, and find they like it; they could discover that being a member of the club doesn't have to mean only going on work trips, or local day trips. They could rent the Putman cabin and stay for a week in the woods, take it easy every, or go on multiple hikes and adventures in the surrounding National Forest and various parks and scenic places. There are places galore within a half hours drive of the cabin, and the cabin is a secure, beautiful, simple haven to come home to, a wonderful work of art in the middle of the forest, ringed by wild mountains.

Think about renting the cabin and enjoying as much time as you can there.

5 Days and 4 Nights in Paradise

Not to be confused with luxury, False Cape State Park is one of the most beautiful, remote, and primitive state parks in Virginia, and it's located right here in Virginia Beach. I've wanted to camp here for some time now. A recent Tuesday Group bike trip, led by Bruce Julian (resident expert on False Cape), provided a good reminder of what a unique place this is. And a planned maintenance day, also run by Bruce, provided a great opportunity to both camp and help out with some needed maintenance chores.

Access to False Cape is very limited. This is not car camping. Overnight parking is permitted at Little Island Park in Sandbridge and the choice is to walk, bike or paddle to False Cape. Boating is also an option if you happen to own one, but I do not. I chose to bike, but also bring along some essential toys, a surf board and paddle board.

The plan was good but the execution fell a little short. I biked in on a rainy Tuesday afternoon and at around mile 7 of the 8-mile journey to my selected camp site the chain came off my bike. I walked the bike and boards the rest of the way to my site. Turns out the bike had a crank bearing issue and would not be the source of transportation I had planned on. The tow behind board cart was also a bit taxed by the journey and wasn't as well suited for the SUP as it was the surf board. As with any good camping trip, the rest of the time was spent enjoying myself and figuring out how to improvise.

False Cape Ocean Side campsites are the most remote and don't have potable water but are worth the journey. There was one other camper the first night, Keith. He began his journey on Cedar Island in NC and had biked north on Highway 12 and was almost to his Little Island destination. He also told me he's been section hiking the AT is very close to completing the entire trail.

Campers have a choice of setting up at their campsite or pitching a tent on the beach. I did both with a tent on the beach and a hammock at the camp site. Camping on the beach has been a "dream" of mine for a while. High tide came within about 10' of my tent the first night. The wind was pretty brisk and not so relaxing, so I wound up spending most of the night in the hammock. Ultimately for me, I found to beach to have too much wind and wave energy for a good restful sleep and preferred the campsite where I still had the sound of the ocean but much calmer.

Wednesday was maintenance day and as promised Bruce picked me up at the site for a day of maintenance. The brush that grows into the access road needs to be periodically trimmed back so that passengers on the open-air bus don't get wacked while in transit. Bruce is a workhorse and did the lion's share of the work, but I was happy to be able to remove the trimmings and use my silky saw to take care of the larger branches. I did enough work to warrant an afternoon nap in the hammock. When I woke up, Keith was gone and I had the entire camp area to myself. I like people, but I also cherish some quality solo time, and this is about as good as it gets.

Thursday was touring day beginning with a walk down the beach to Corova, NC. Along the way I came across rangers inspecting and protecting a turtle nesting site. The turtle tracks to and from the dune line were still visible in the sand. Continuing the journey, a thunderstorm came through so I took shelter under an unoccupied house. Don't tell anyone, but I also "borrowed" some electricity to charge my phone. Touring the southern trails of False Cape was very rewarding. After a nap in the hammock, I had great surf session. Not great surfing, but a great time in the water. Waves were good with clean conditions and very comfortable water temperature. Water temp dropped around 10-15 degrees the next day.

More campers arrived Thursday. While initially disappoint at having to "share" the camp area, I found them to be very pleasant and hardy adventurers.

Friday was HOT with temperatures reaching 95 degrees. While not the weather I'd pick, it is the weather I got, so I adjusted my activities accordingly. Time in the shade, reading instead of hiking, time in the water and so on.

On Saturday I hiked out the 8 miles, pushing the bike loaded with all my gear. The rangers would have carted me out if I'd asked, but I told them "I got myself into this mess, I'll get myself out." With an early start, I <u>had pleasant</u> temperatures, a low tide and the opportunity to watch the sunrise. What a great way to end my stay.

Bug spray was an essential, and I certainly got a few bites, but it wasn't a deal breaker. Time didn't mean much other than the position of the sun, amount of shade, and the high and low tide cycle. The turtle nest was super cool to see, unfortunately there were also two dead turtles on the beach. There were a ton of birds singing including Carolina Wren, Red-winged Blackbird, Chuck-will's-widow, Pine Warbler, Tufted Titmouse, Brow-headed Nuthatch, and more (ID thanks to Merlin the phone app). I saw a Bald Eagle on a pole not 50' away, but he flew off before I could get a picture. Osprey was numerous. The only snake I saw was a small Copperhead. There was also a long set of tracks from a wolf or coyote on the beach, apparently looking for breakfast.

I'll definitely do the trip again with either less gear or better equipment, or both. I also have room for improvement on meal planning which will also help with time in the mountains. If you haven't been to False Cape, or haven't been in a while, it is definitely worth the time and effort.

Forest Service News Release

Saint Mary's River Trail will be intermittently closed in August and September during trail improvement projects

Natural Bridge, VA, July 28, 2022—The USDA Forest Service, in partnership with Southern Appalachian Wilderness Stewards (SAWS), will be working to stabilize and restore sections of the Saint Mary's River trail (Forest Trail #500) in Saint Mary's Wilderness in Augusta County. The 1.3-mile trail section from the trailhead at the parking lot to the intersection with the Saint Mary's Gorge trail Forest Trail #500B) will be intermittently closed for public and worker safety during the trail work in August and September.

The tentative dates of closure are:

August 3-4 August 8-12 August 24-31 September 7-14

September 21-28



Visitors may still access fishing opportunities at the Saint Mary's River trailhead up to the point of trail work, less than one-half mile from the parking lot. Visitors to Saint Mary's Wilderness will be able to access the area from Mine Bank Creek trailhead on the Blue Ridge Parkway, Cellar Mountain trailhead on the Coal Road (Forest Service Road #42), and from Bald Mountain Road (Jeep Trail – Forest Service Road #162). Visitors can continue to access Saint Mary's Falls via the Mine Bank Creek trail, a 9-mile round-trip hike. Visitors should be prepared for a more strenuous hike when following this route.

Trail work will focus on repairing damage caused by remnant hurricane storms. Trail repair work will include moving large rocks by cable hoist to stabilize undermined trail sections to protect against future highwater events. Project work is expected to continue into calendar year 2023 and additional closure dates may be announced.

"I appreciate everyone's patience during these temporary closures as we work to address much needed repairs in this special place," said District Ranger Lauren Stull. "We are fortunate to be able to work with our partner, SAWS, to improve visitor experiences on the trail and protect the trail along the St. Mary's River."






