We spent time talking with the attendees on Friday night and Saturday morning to find out how they felt and what they felt like working on. 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at CCC Kitchen was ready for our arrival. Pete also did a lot of mowing at CCC Kitchen area and at Reids Gap trail head before we got there - making our job much easier!

This time he removed a fallen tree (before we arrived) that was blocking our access to the fire road at Love Gap. Thanks to Jim Sexton, one of our sawyers, for volunteering to lead a group to remove a blow down reported on the MauHar Trail. Thanks to everyone who came out to help despite the steamy weather. Last, and certainly not least, thanks to John Sima for his leadership in organizing and executing these events throughout the year. John has an understanding and appreciation of what is needed at each event and assigns leads based on the work requirements.

All our Swingblade/Lopperfest events and Fall Maintenance events have been scheduled, so please mark your calendars now as this is why we are a club - to maintain our 10.2-mile section (from Tye River to Reed's Gap) of the Appalachian Trail! If you are concerned about the level of work, please let me know and I will work with you for your assignment. We all want to have FUN while working.

Those are the highest numbers that I can remember for these events. What we do in these events is trim back the vegetation growth that encroaches the trails. Ticks like to hang out on this overhanging vegetation hoping to latch on to any hiker or mammal that walks by. Lymes disease is my #1 fear on the trail, these events help prevent that.

John Oaks & Greg Seid did a great job in St Mary's Wilderness, on the Bald Mountain Overlook trail (this is the trail that parallels the Parkway) during Lopperfest 1. They cleared 15 blowdowns in a 1-mile stretch. With this information, Michael Lowry (our SAWS Wilderness Ranger) and I tackled the remaining section during Lopperfest 2. We cleared an additional 19 blowdowns, a long day's work! Thanks Michael!

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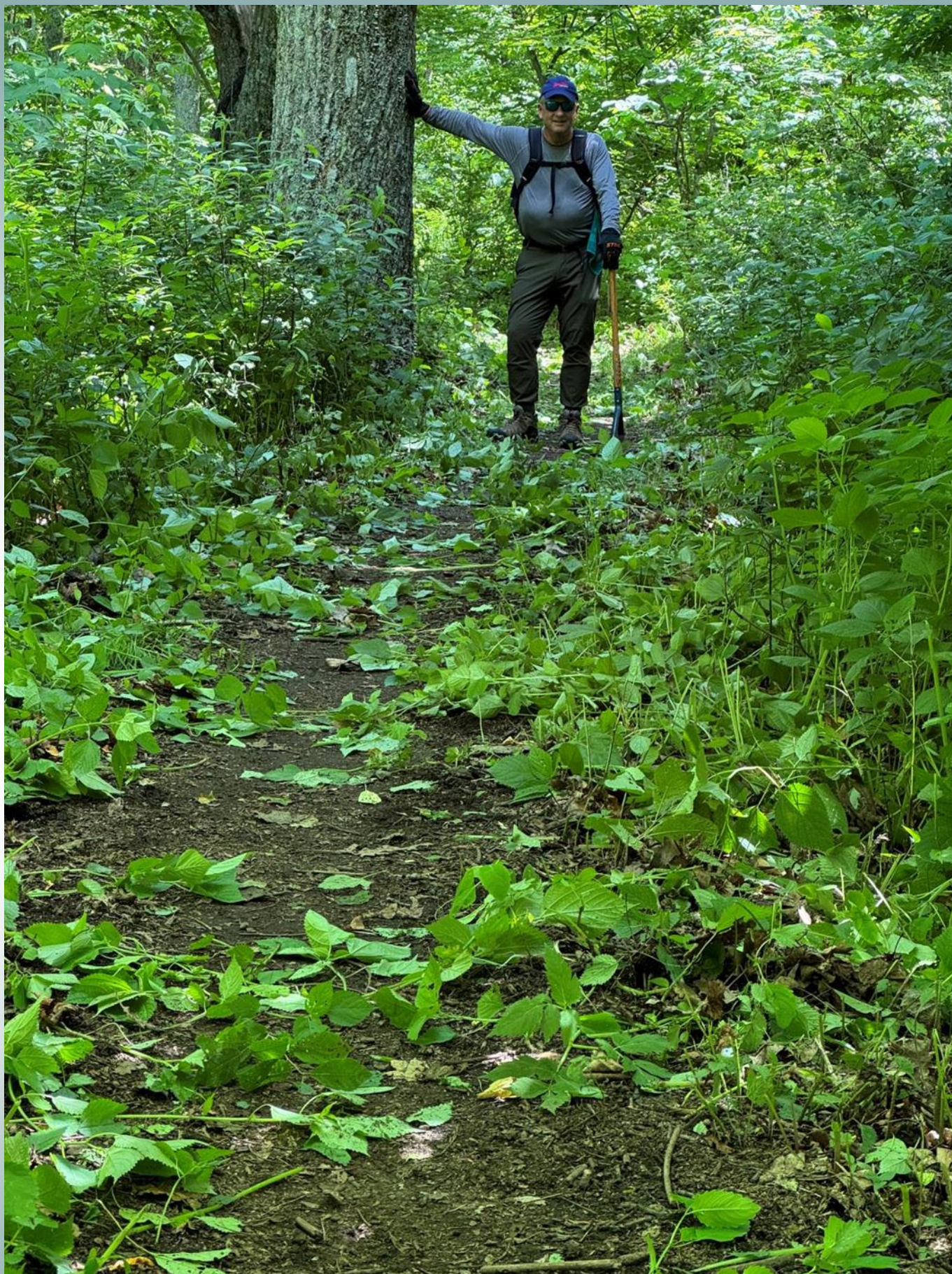

Multiple tables were set up for grills, serving, hiker supplies and a charging station. Watermelon was cut on location and served ice cold. Manning the grill were Jim Newman and later, Lelia Vann, who quickly became legendary amongst the hikers, dishing up double-decker cheeseburgers with fried onions on the side. 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A hiker supply table included freeze-dried meals, suntan lotion, insecticide, bandanas, small flashlights, toothbrushes, and other items. In total, 31 hikers were served during the day, including 20 thru-hikers. Two were international hikers, 'Big Bird' from Shrewsbury England, and 'Judge' from the Netherlands. Pierre, from Syracuse NY, proclaimed that the TATC fare was "the best burger on the trail...no wait, it's the best burger I've ever had in my life". Pierre was glad to sit for a while in the provided chairs, actually, he sat for hours, happy to rest before ascending Three Ridges. Towards the end of the afternoon, Michelle did some watermelon outreach, crossing over the bridge to distribute leftover watermelon to a group of day hikers, while talking up the club's efforts in the mountains and in Hampton Roads. Trail Magic was over by 4, and after hoisting all the gear back up the trail, which somehow seemed steeper, everyone regrouped and headed off to Smokin' Barrel restaurant in Arrington for dinner.

Special thanks go out to the Sextons, who hosted the volunteers and supplied Friday's dinner at their Cub Creek home, and also to TATC members who helped fund this year's Trail Magic. Leftover food and drinks were used the following weekend by Lopperfest #1 volunteers, and remaining hiker items are stored for future Trail Magic.

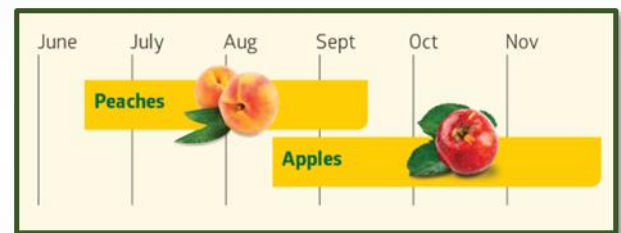

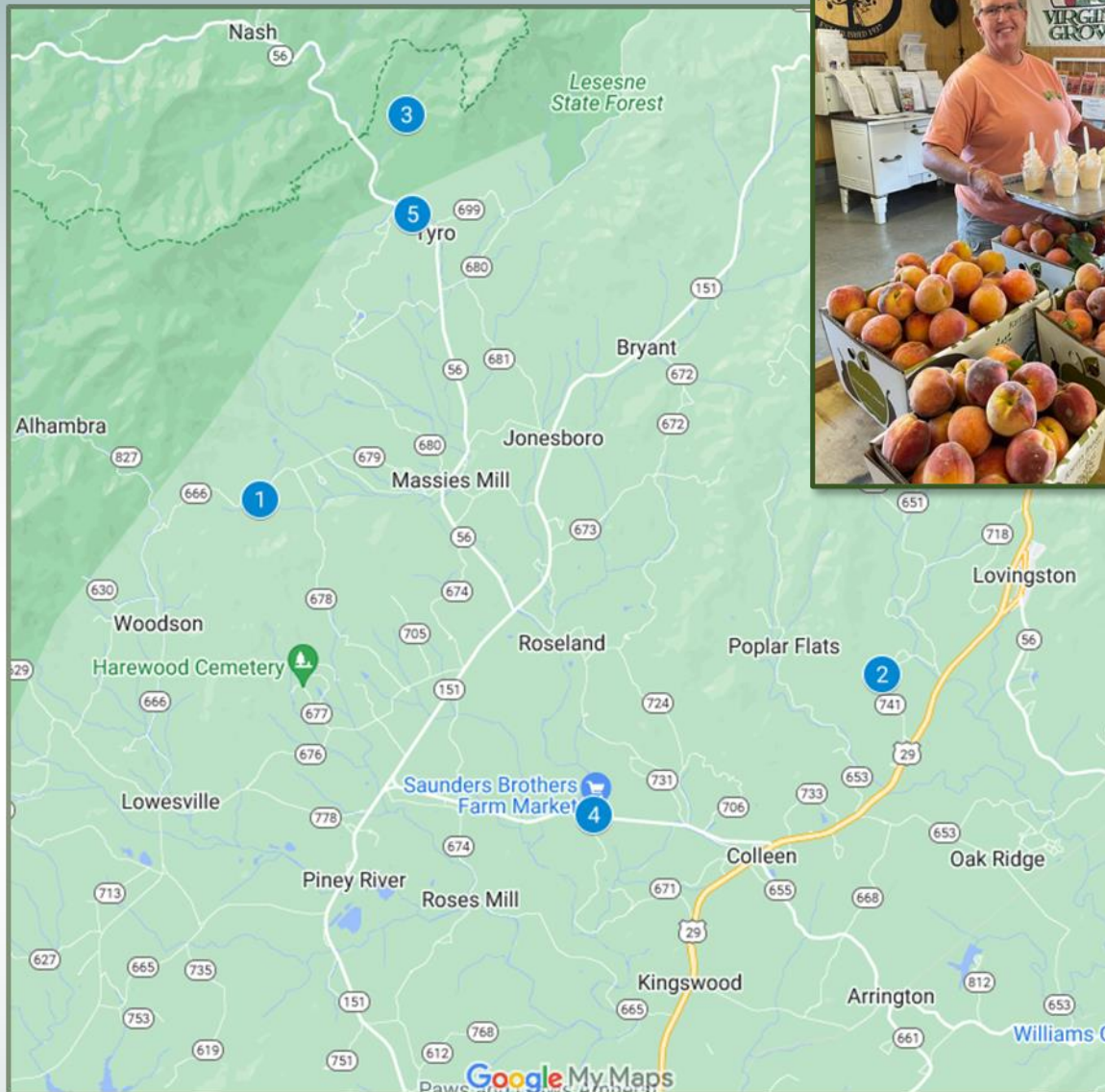

We chose the Deer Head Inn in Delaware Water Gap, PA and had a terrific time hiking the AT in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. The inn also had live jazz music in the evenings and a fantastic restaurant. It was truly a great weekend.

Here are 2 new suggestions for a late August or September trip:

1. **Grayson Highlands and/or Mount Rogers staying in Damascus, VA** (known for the small ponies, the Creeper Trail, and Trail Days). We can have several day hikes and/or bike the creeper trail. We could stay at the Damascus Old Mill Inn. We could also stay in Abingdon where there's more to do but the AT goes through the town of Damascus.



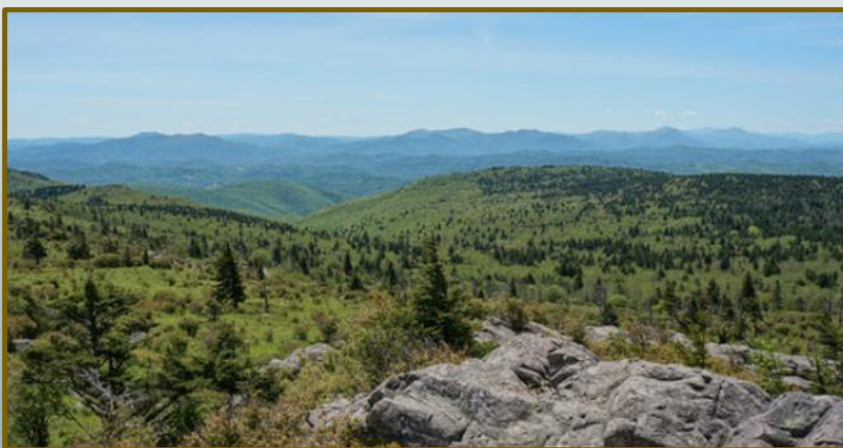

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2. Reid's Gap to Tye River

Another possibility for a day hike would be our section of the AT from Reid's Gap to Tye River. We could have cars at both ends of the trail and stay overnight at Sherando Lake Recreation Area camp ground.

Elevation highest/lowest points: 3972' high and 971' low

Cumulative elevation gain/loss: 3684' gain and 1978' loss

This completes the project which began back in March. FLSP staff can now spray any reemergent shoots, to keep this invasive species under control. Thanks to our Navy service members, and to Lee Lohman for helping lead these great young volunteers!

There is one thing that I would like to bring to your attention. The woodpiles are not being replenished enough. Please see the attached images. In November 2023, there was an overflow of people working the firewood cutting trip to down dead trees and then cut and stack the woodpiles. There are plenty of visible woodpiles to pick from. Please be mindful on your next trip when you burn firewood for the stove and the fireplace.



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JUNE had ZERO cabin reservations, which means there is no revenue to report. The only expense incurred was \$9.21 for a ball catch that will be installed during the next maintenance weekend for the toilet paper holder in the outhouse. The ball catch locks the coffee can that covers the toilet paper into place. JULY has seen ONE cabin reservation. This was the niece of Douglas Putman, namesake of the cabin, who rents the cabin once per year. AUGUST has 9 nights of reservations amongst 3 different reservations. Remember that cabin rentals are FREE through August to encourage people going to the cabin to keep an eye on it during the slow months.

The next cabin maintenance and orientation trip is September 13-15. There are currently 6 people signed up including both members of the cabin committee.

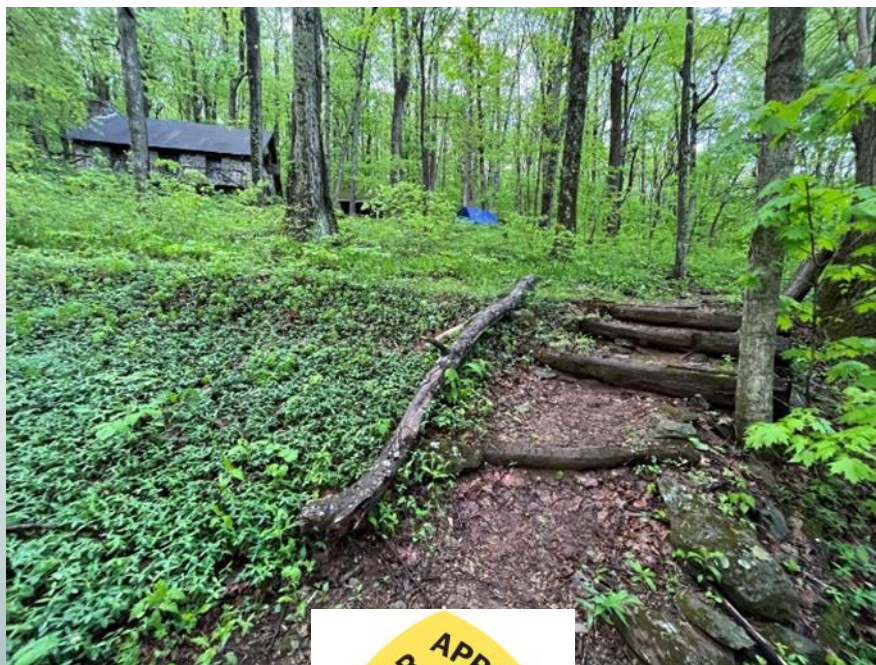

Tool Talk

Well, I certainly didn't know what I was getting into when I agreed to be Tool Boss back in February! I thought I'd just need to straighten up a little and take an inventory of the tools. Then as I started digging deeper into the many storage totes and people started bringing back tools and supplies that they were either using or storing for the club, it quickly became apparent just how much stuff the TATC owns and how much I was going to be responsible for tracking and maintaining. I'm really enjoying digging into the tools, learning how to clean and sharpen them, and finding some club history along the way, such as, old maps, photos and even an email about the relocation of the Mau Har to Tye River trail.

The Club's trail maintenance tools and outreach supplies are stored in a roughly 100 square foot self-storage shed in Portsmouth, VA and a small storage locker at Sherando Lake Recreation Area near Lyndhurst, VA.



Cleaning the local shed started small with disposing of 23 hard hats that were well past their useful life, some as many as 28 years old! The club donated bow saws to a local Scout troop and Lelia generously offered to store the electronic equipment – projectors, a video recorder, P.A. System, etc. – in her personal storage until we can find a permanent home for it.

The major cleanout happened in June when Lelia, Greg, Lee, and John Barnes joined me on a Saturday morning to empty the storage unit, sort through everything, and help decide what we would keep. We got rid of expired COVID supplies, a canopy that hadn't been used in over a decade, and miscellaneous gear that is just no longer useful to the club. Lee's meticulous inventory shows that we have over 40 different types of trail maintenance items totaling over 200 individual pieces of equipment in the tool shed.



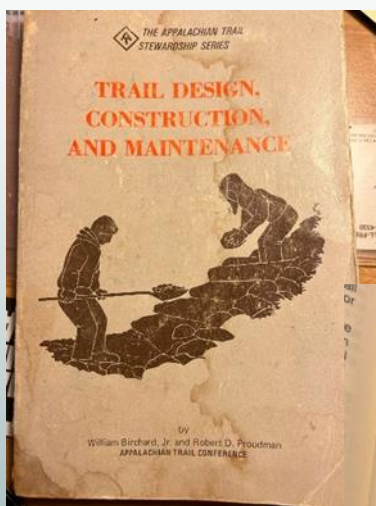
After taking stock of what was left, we had the pleasure of putting everything back in the shed. We were happy to see that we now have some empty storage totes and space to move around.

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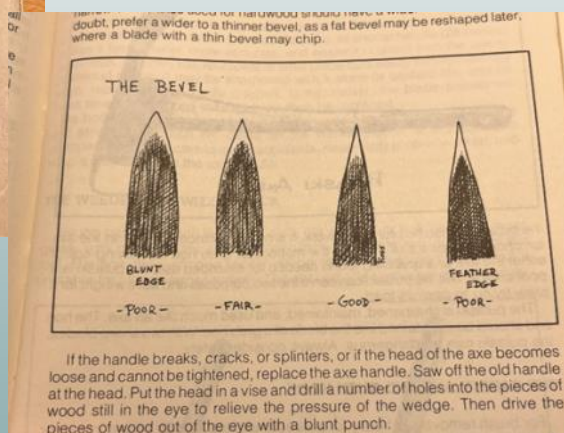
I mentioned finding some club history earlier. I found this picture, obviously not taken in the wilderness, of someone clearing a tree in August 2011.



While being Tool Boss is a bit more work than I was anticipating, I'm totally enjoying it. I'm discovering a whole new world of tool maintenance that I didn't know existed before with the help of YouTube videos that show different approaches to sharpening loppers and cleaning crosscut saws. As well as using the various TATC documentation and books such as the "Trail Design, Construction and Maintenance" manual.



I love learning new skills that let me get my hands dirty, and there's something meditative about sharpening swing blades by hand. I hope I can continue to help keep the shed organized and those tools sharp for everyone who joins us during trail maintenance.

Norfolk Urban Bike Ride-S & S

Description: Meet at 9:15 am; depart at 9:30. Rendezvous at Lafayette Park in Norfolk (near the Zoo on Granby Street). Park entrance is off of Granby St. at 38th – there's a traffic light here - turn on LaValette, opposite 38th Street, go about 200 yards and turn right into the park entrance. For the breakfast crowd, meet at 8:30 at the MacDonald's on Granby, about ¼ mile north of LaValette. Before leaving Lafayette Park, we can use the public bathroom there or at the nearby McDonalds on Granby. Other bathroom stops at Nauticus and/or at Waterside.

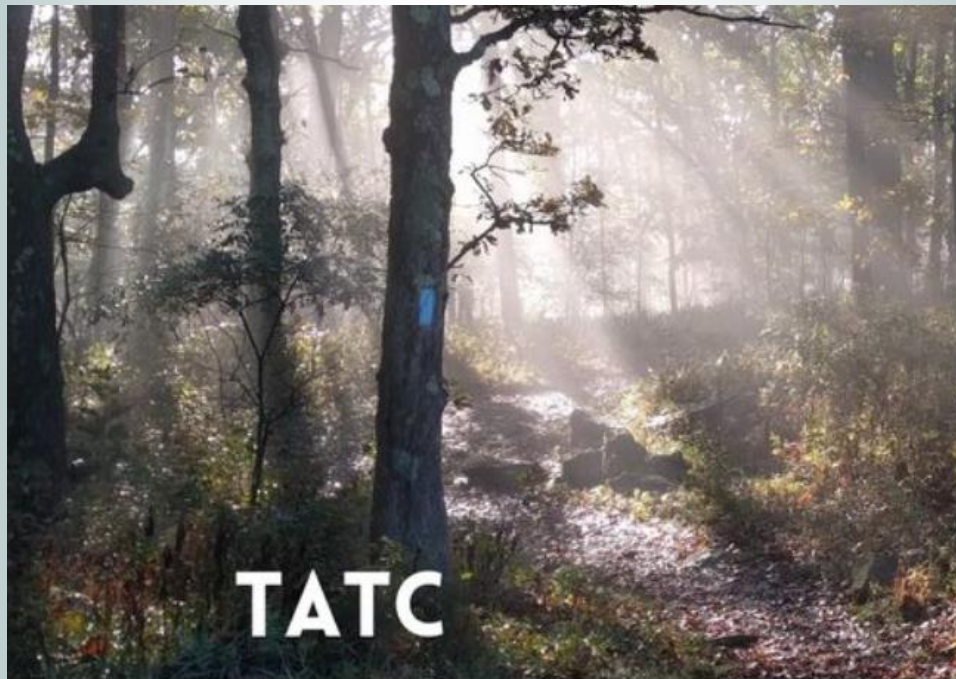

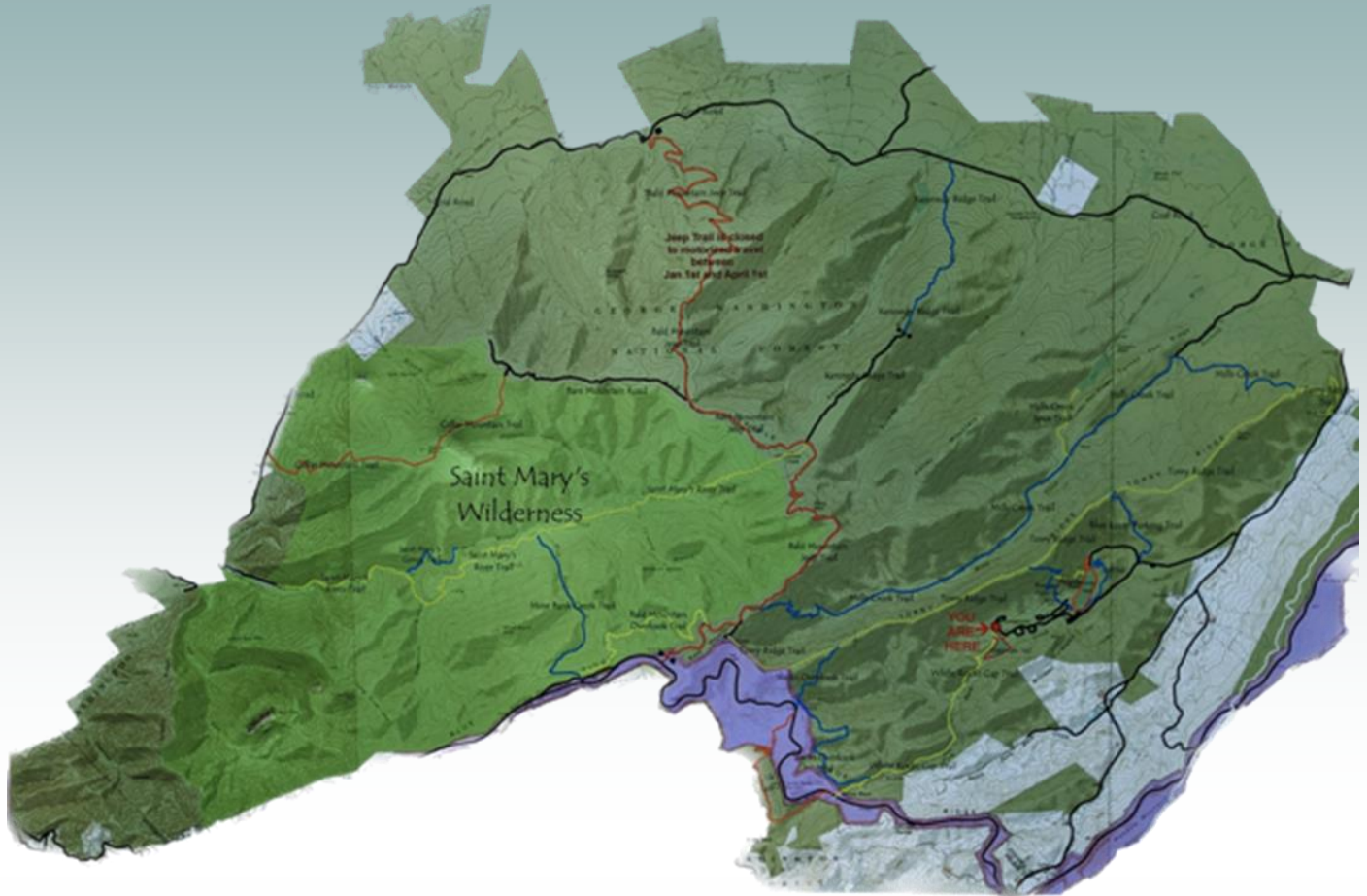
