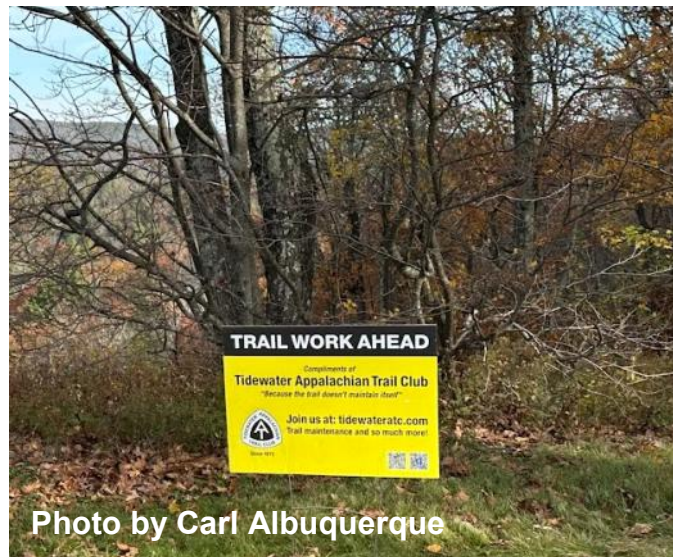
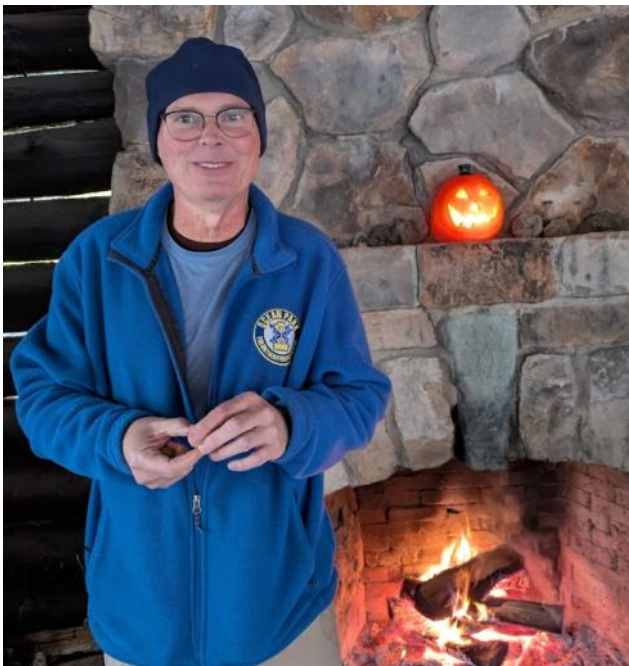

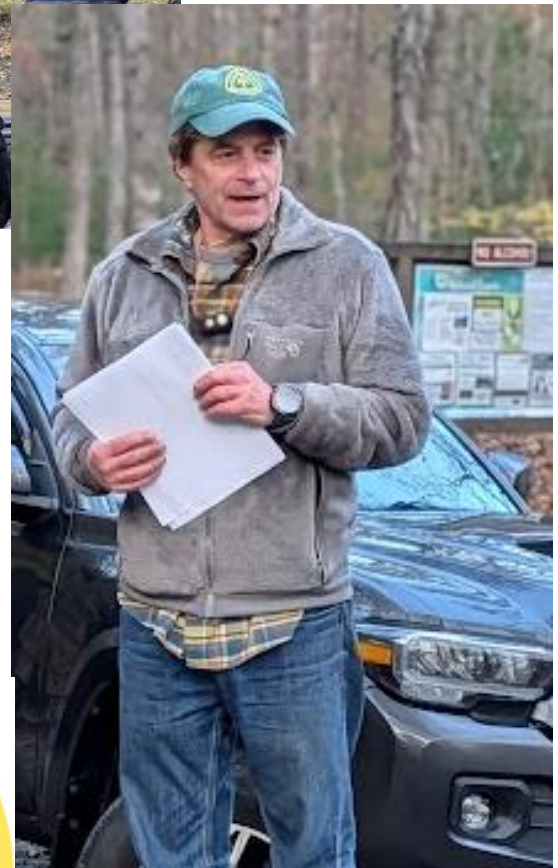

TATC Included in Helene Recovery Stewardship Agreement

Last fall, Hurricane Helene had a devastating impact in several southeastern states including significant damage to portions of the Appalachian Trail. As part of the 2025 American Recovery Act (ARA), Helene recovery funds have been transferred through a 5-year agreement from the US Forest Service to the ATC. These funds will be used to “*restore recreation access, improve habitat, and repair damaged infrastructure. Work will include assessing the trail & facilities from GA through central VA, identifying and developing projects, implementing projects, and coordinating trail management during Helene recovery.*”

On November 18, 2025, TATC signed a 5-year agreement with ATC that defines the specific obligations agreed to by both parties relating to Helene recovery and associated USFS funds. TATC is the northernmost trail club included in the agreement which includes the following:

ATC will:

Jointly plan, support & monitor ARA projects with TATC and USFS on a monthly or quarterly basis,
Support direct-to-club purchase of saw equipment and PPE,
Support contracted chainsaw & crosscut training & evaluation,
5 seasons of the Tye River Ridgerunner,
Support a termed Non-Native Invasive Species coordinator, treatments and inventory,

And TATC will:

Track & report individual club member volunteer hours by month to ATC (as an in-kind contribution),
Provide volunteer hours per year on all activities in its area of responsibility, whether or not the work is associated with ARA-funded activities.

Both parties will:

Meet quarterly to coordinate, plan, develop, and implement projects that are included in the scope of this agreement.
Not commence project work until they receive written permission from the designated Forest Service representative.

FROM THE TATC TIMEKEEPER:

TATC will be submitting volunteer hours to ATC reported by members on the following forms:

Federal Lands Trail Maintenance & Related Admin
Outreach & Communication
TATC Management & Admin (selected activities)

Since reporting to ATC will be monthly, it is important that all time volunteered in these areas be reported. Please make sure that your time is being reported.

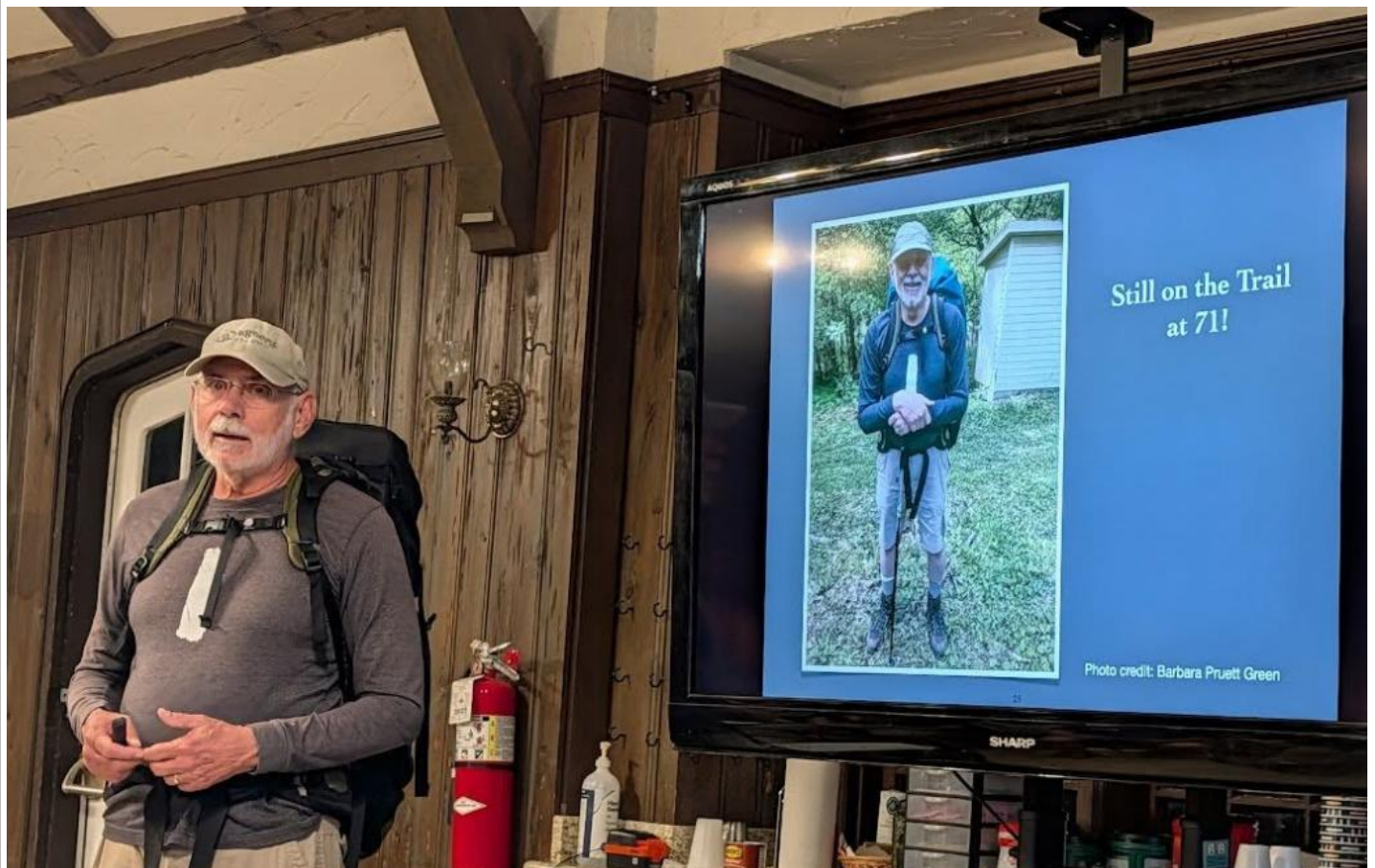
Guest Presentation during the October General Membership Meeting

Hiking the AT in the Virginias: A Septuagenarian's Journey, by David Pruett

ONE Trails

These mountains, in several ways rivaling the western scenery, are within a day's ride from centers containing more than half of the population of the United States.¹

—BENTON MACKAYE

WALKING THE AT OF THE VIRGINIAS RANGES from a stroll in the park—quite literally at Harpers Ferry National Historic Park, Shenandoah National Park, and Sky Meadows and Grayson Highlands State Parks—to a grueling slog on northern Virginia's tortuous, ankle-busting "Roller Coaster." There is also everything in between: broad fire roads, rocky ledges, country lanes, rock-strewn wilderness, a stretch of U.S. 52, boulder fields, tunnels of rhododendron, stairs, bridges, wetlands, and meadows—both high and low.

Along its entire course, the AT twice exceeds 6,000 feet in elevation, at Kuwohi (also known as Clingman's Dome) in the Smoky Mountains of North Carolina and much farther north in the Presidential Range of New Hampshire. The trail dips to its lowest point, just over 100 feet above sea level, at a bridge crossing the Hudson River in New York. Needless to say, there's a lot of up and down, so much so that an end-to-end hiker will ascend and descend the equivalent of sixteen Mount Everests!²

The AT of the Virginias is no exception. Precious little is level. In a typical twenty-five-mile section-hike, one can expect to climb at least a mile and descend by an equal amount, for an average gradient of eight percent. Most of the AT in the Virginias is well graded, and switchbacks tame steep ascents, limiting most grades to about ten percent, a foot of rise for every ten feet of horizontal distance.

The greatest continuous ascent/descent within the Virginias lies in the Tye River watershed of Nelson and Amherst Counties. Heading south from the 4,000-foot summit of Three Ridges, one descends to the Tye River, 1,000 feet above sea level, only to regain the entire half-mile-plus vertical loss in a continuous climb to the summit of The Priest. Along the four-mile trail up The Priest, the gradient is a taxing 750 feet per mile, almost fifteen percent, but, mercifully, is nearly constant the whole way.

There are, however, here and there in Virginia, scattered stretches of trail with gradients as high as twenty percent, and on these sections one curses the trail blazer. Thankfully, most are short. Steep uphill is hard on the heart and lungs. Steep downhill is worse: treacherous. It's murder on the knees and rife with opportunity for a tumble, particularly when the trail is wet or the hiker exhausted. Most AT thru-hikers are four-footed creatures, relying on two hiking poles. I'm told by an orthopedist this reduces stress on the knees by thirty percent.

Two of the most tormenting section of the AT that I've hiked, however, were nearly flat boulder fields: a section north of Reeds Gap along the upper Blue Ridge Parkway and another north of Bailey Gap Shelter and south of Mountain Lake Wilderness. Above Bailey Gap the AT traverses across more than a mile of large, moss-encrusted stones through an utterly primeval forest. Loose stones, which are abundant, tilt disconcertingly under the hiker's weight. The boulder field at Reeds Gap is not nearly so long, but I hiked it after days of rain had rendered the stones perilously slick. The concentration necessary to avoid a spill was so vexing that, upon arriving safely at my car, I immediately developed a migraine.



On a beautiful fall day in 2018, citizens from all walks of life and political persuasions gathered to oppose the 600-mile-long Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP), which, had it been completed, would have crossed the AT at Reeds Gap, site of the protest. In July 2020, developers of the ACP cancelled the project, in large part due to economic and environmental realities and well-organized, informed and relentless bi-partisan opposition.
